PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Klein Older Adult Services

Senior Concierge HomeCare is growing with 23,477 hours of homecare provided and 2,700 hours of free respite provided for family caregivers. JFCS has grown the number of aides we now employ from 3 to 16.



5,645 PALS transportation rides were provided to seniors and persons with disabilities. Joy!Ride made it possible for Jewish seniors to attend Shabbat services, High Holiday services, Passover Seders, Chavurat Shalom and other special events in the Jewish community.

126 Holocaust survivors attended a training workshop to facilitate the application for special stipends to provide dental care, emergency services and financial assistance.



Mazon funding for Solutions to Senior Hunger program was secured to assist seniors with application for food stamps. More than 200 seniors have been educated about this program and bi-monthly application events are being conducted.

Counseling Services

Therapists provided counseling to more than 1,600 clients and their family members, helping people to cope with stressors, trauma, abuse, family relationships and grief. Increased services for non-English speaking clients were offered.



Hanukkah Helpers, sponsored with Temple Shalom, provided 54 children with clothing, accessories and toys at Hanukkah. Passover food baskets were provided for 34 families this year and Thanksgiving baskets went to 32 families.

JFCS Food Pantry, funded in part by the Janet and Sonny Meyer Family Food Pantry Fund, served more than 140 people each month with supplemental food.

Career and Workforce Development Services

Our KCCGO program for the long-term unemployed won a national award from IAJVS. This program, sponsored with Kentuckiana Works, features a unique service delivery model, a high job placement rate (70%) and has served more than 200 participants.

JFCS launched a new supported employment program working with employers and people with disabilities to secure gainful employment. During the first part of this year, career specialists have worked with 11 people, securing 8 meaningful jobs.



Career assessment and management services were provided to more than 350 clients with career challenges. An additional 300 refugees were served with advanced career/employment services through our Career Academy.

JFCS expanded many of its career and employment related workshops including LinkedIn, Speed Networking and Entrepreneurial Discovery. JFCS was chosen by Leadership Louisville Encore program to receive help in developing a networking and mentoring program for clients.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

LHOME (Louisville Home Opportunities and Micro-Enterprise)

Micro-lending began directly from LHOME.

An intensive consultative process designed to fully develop policies and procedures for LHOME was completed in preparation for certification by the US Treasury Department.

Navigate Enterprise Center

Staff helped to start or expand 34 micro-businesses. 33 jobs were created and retained and more than 177 people were helped with business services and business coaching.

Engagement Project

Funded through the Jewish Heritage Fund for Excellence, staff explored best practices in engaging leaders and volunteers in the Jewish community.



We began a listening campaign, focus groups and research into best practices for community engagement. Through these initial efforts, we are already seeing increased community awareness of JFCS mission and services.

Volunteer Services

Jazz and Jewelry event raised more than \$3600 for the Sonny and Janet Meyer Family Food Pantry Fund. The event attracted new people to JFCS and will be repeated.



The Carole and Larry Goldberg Family Mitzvah program offered three opportunities for families to do Tikkun Olam projects this year, including a Purim parade at a local senior living home.

The Doris L. and Theodore B. Meyers Shabbos Friends program has attracted new volunteers and has newly developed guides for the volunteers to use to enhance the experience.

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A Message From The Agency's Leadership

This has been a busy year at JFCS with much energy invested in strengthening and enhancing our programs, which serve 9,000 people in the Metro Louisville area. We always are seeking out ways to improve and expand our services in response to the changing needs of the community and the methods and technologies available to address them.



Our new supported employment program serving people with disabilities is showing some success in helping these clients to find meaningful work experiences. We were honored to receive the International Association of Jewish Vocational Service (IAJVS) Program of the Year Award for our long-term unemployment program. Additionally we have developed several new ways to help our clients find work, through networking opportunities and entrepreneurial workshops.

We have expanded our Senior Concierge Homecare program, reducing our contracted services and increasing our own workforce of aides. This program is providing the highest quality of non-medical homecare available for our clients.

We were honored to work with an Encore Team from Leadership Louisville this year, creating a new program for refugees to develop networks and find work. Our counseling program continues to see people from all walks of life who need help in handling the stressors of life, and we continue to be a strong training site for future therapists.



The Navigate Enterprise Center has strengthened its position in the micro-enterprise community and is helping entrepreneurs become more self-sufficient. LHOME, our community development financial institution has reached several milestones this year, including its first loans.

Volunteers continue to play an amazing role at JFCS. 447 volunteers provided more than 24,000 hours of volunteer service. As part of our strategic planning process, we are actively exploring ways to engage new leaders and volunteers and are grateful for the support from the Jewish Heritage Fund for Excellence in these efforts.

We continue to focus on many of the most vulnerable people in our community. Whether it is providing services directly, helping people access other community resources, or providing food for our clients via our award winning food pantry, JFCS helps to care for the entire person and family. We strengthen families, foster self-awareness and sound decision-making and promote well-being and self-sufficiency. Through every season of life, people can find services all under one roof provided in a highly professional, compassionate way.

We are fortunate at JFCS to have an amazing team of people who are committed to the agency. Our dedicated, creative and mission-driven staff and our visionary and strategic Board of Directors are two of the strongest members of this team. Additionally, we have amazing volunteers, essential community partners and stakeholders and generous donors who all play major roles in our success. First and foremost though are our clients. They trust us to help them negotiate life's issues and demands and we are truly honored by their trust. Thank you for partnering with us to make our community a better place in which to live.


